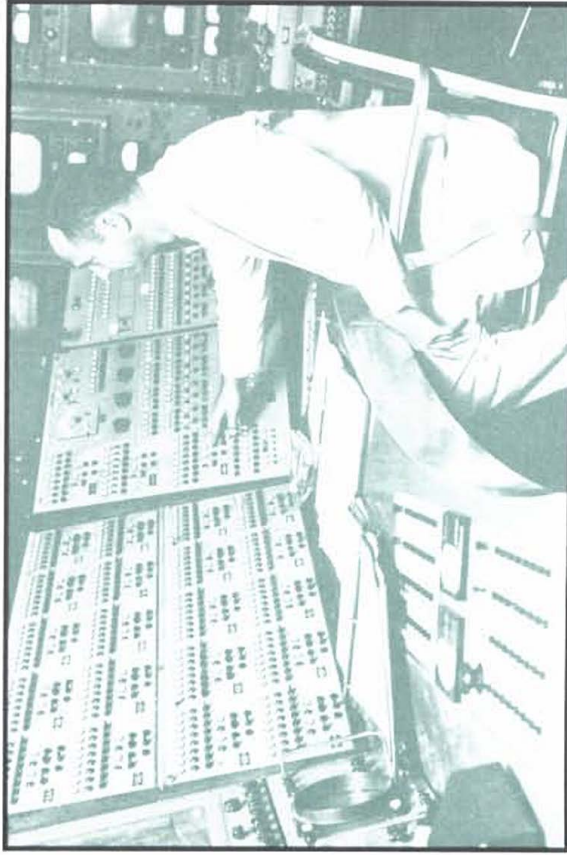

Th service will bring participants to campus prior to the first session each day and will return participants to the hotel after the last session each evening.
